The PDC was held in the first half of the year, the first after a break in 2022 to enable the committee to regroup and refresh. #### **Education Report**

The Permaculture Design Course (PDC) ran in the first half of this year, having not run in 2022. We were based at the Uniting building in Dyte parade, with some sessions run at Chestnut Farm when we needed space or the ability to be messy! New presenters and field trips were trialled, and the course was very successful. We are fortunate to have access to some great local presenters and homes and; farms to visit. The training room at Dyte Pde is such that we've limited our enrolments to 15 students, which encourages everyone to get to know each other much more than happens in a larger group. This years course group formed particularly strong bonds. The level of openness and sharing was great to see and really added to the experience for everyone.

Unfortunately, our level of other education activity was really down on previous years. This is a pity, because education is a key priority for BPG.

We are failing to regularly run our Introduction to Permaculture short course and our What is Permaculture? information sessions. We ran an Introduction to Permaculture one day course during 2023, but the three presenters who had shared delivery then all resigned (for different reasons – they all agreed the course went very well!)

Both the Introduction to Permaculture and What is Permaculture? are very easy to run since the format, schedule and course material are already developed. All we need is some dedicated people who will volunteer to deliver them a few times a year. What is Permaculture? is an evening session that runs for a couple of hours. The Intro course is a single day. It easily works for multiple presenters to take parts of the day. If you'd like to be involved, please contact me to find out more!:)

### **Permablitz Report**

We had a successful year of Permablitz with one blitz on average per quarter. We ended 2022 after the AGM on a high note with a big blitz at Barry's Navigator homestead. While the weather was a bit awful (being the Spring that everything flooded!) we managed to take care of sheet mulching, natural fencing, chicken tractor creation, wiking bed creation and plant guilds as part of their attempt to introduce permaculture and regenerative farming techniques into their small farm.

In autumn, we started with a two-part blitz in Invermay at Chestnut Farm. We started with a focus on trees, mostly fruit and oaks planted as part of the farm's bushfire defence strategy. We refreshed a 2metre wide forest garden planting and garden around the Cubby as well as attended to a lot of vegetable gardens. The second part was the installation of an Antiaviary over a row of five apple trees planted as a firest garden strip along the driveway.

In winter we returned to UnitingCare to focus on their fruit trees this time. A small group pruned fruit trees that hadn't been touched in years. It was a very substantial pile of branches that took a few trips to get rid of!! It allowed those who attended Ellen's pruning workshops to try out their new skills! we will return over summer with The Hidden Orchard to see if they bear fruit and consider how we can continue to improve the health of the trees and follow up with another pruning blitz next Spring.

We headed over in early Spring to Rocklyn to work on a small homestead that has been built to maximise sustainability and liveability. We construct a large flower bed with bricks, sheet mulched and spread compost and soil ready for the bulb planting (with a view to sales to help support the homestead). Several wiking beds were created near the house for herbs. But the big job for the day was the construction of a large polytunnel greenhouse. It was quite the barn raising! Everyone learnt a lot, along with the owners, about how to set it up and the fiddly work of coordinating many people to roll the plastic over and get it snuggly attached to the frame. It is a large space and will provide fantastic growing opportunities for this family.

Barry and Jenny worked on a small blitz to install a community verge garden in Ballarat which is still coming to fruition but will be a valuable addition to the area. Verge gardens are still uncommon in Ballarat and Jenny has bravely taken on the Council permit system to get this space up and running.

And in October we ended the year with a book launch with one of the Milkwood founders at the Old Colonist Club. We had a large group attend to hear from our Hidden Orchard president, Ellen Burns, in conversation with Kirsten from Milkwood about her new book and why it was so important in the world now to be a permaculturalist!

Looking forward in 2024 to a heap of members coming forward with offers to host blitzes as their places so we can continue the skill sharing and learning for old and new members. Come speak to Barry or Fiona at the AGM about nominating a month and idea for your blitz! We should be kicking off in Term 1 when school goes back.

#### Membership

#### The Hidden Orchard

The Hidden Orchard (THO) harvests fruit from backyard or public land fruit trees and distributes the

harvest one third to the homeowner, one third to the pickers and one third to charity. Founded in 2017, THO is a volunteer group auspiced by Ballarat Permaculture Guild.

It has been a disappointing season this year, with many trees not developing fruit or fruit not ripening. We are attributing this to the crazy weather at the end of 2022, too much rain and a late summer severely impacting our harvest quantities. We are harvesting some citrus at the moment, but may not even hit half a tonne before the end of the year, when we have never harvested less than a tonne before!

It has been a brilliant year for our committee though, with the appointment of Renee, our new Treasurer, Marianne, our new volunteer coordinator, Grace, our new social media manager, and Laura. All of the new committee members have already settled and blossomed in their roles, joining Karen and Ellen to form an incredibly strong team. Will has stepped back from the committee due to his increased commitments in NSW, but has stayed on in his role as our Data Manager.

We have had several very successful events this year, including: an olive harvest and brining workshop, beginners pruning workshop and intermediate pruning workshop.

We thank Jean-Paul Trijsburg for volunteering his time as our pruning instructor and to Gillian and Richard, and St James Parish Primary School for hosting.

We were able to raise \$225 from the olive brining workshop (hosted by Ellen) and \$1100 through the pruning workshops.

We also held another Bunnings Sausage Sizzle fundraiser on Grand Final Day, through which we raised \$2040.50

Ellen has represented The Hidden Orchard in the Food Access Network and the Ballarat Local Food Coalition, formed this year.

She had meetings with Darebin Fruit Squad and FoodBank to discuss collaboration opportunities, and was given the StreetHarvest pilot program handbook by Dave (CEO of FoodBank) to use as a template for constructing our own master document. Ellen hopes to create a pack, available for download from the THO website, to help others in starting up their own groups.

This year has seen Ellen mentor two other groups, one in Warrnambool and one in Adelaide, and provide them support and guidance in setting up their own fruit rescue organisations.

We have been offered a donation of two garden sheds from the council, which we will be relocating to Uniting, Dyte Parade, to become a central storage location with 24/7 access. We thank Siobhan Dent for offering us the sheds and Remi and Ivan at Uniting for allowing us to install them there, and for their ongoing support in providing Uniting as a venue for our meetings and workshops.

The Hidden Orchard was awarded a Community Impact Grant for the sum of \$3,207.97 to purchase concrete pavers, shelving, locks and tree care equipment for the new sheds and our tree care and pruning squad, which is a new service that we are hoping to start offering. We are looking for more tree care and pruning volunteers to help with this, which will help our tree owners and greatly increase the quality of fruit that we are able to harvest.

Ellen also submitted an Expression of Interest for the City Partnerships Grant, totalling \$215,000.

This application is to fund the Community Orchard project that The Hidden Orchard and Ballarat Permaculture Guild have been working on for close to two years now.

We are hoping to secure the lease from VicTrack soon and be able to start the project in 2024.
